



Pupil Premium Funding Report - Shottery St Andrew's CE Primary School Sept 2016 – July 2017

Number of Pupils on roll: 85 (July'17)

Number eligible for pupil premium: 13 ("Ever 6 FSM" and "Ever 4 Service Child")

Value of pupil premium per pupil: £1320

Total funding received: £17160 (year ending July'17)

What is pupil premium?

Pupil Premium Grant provides funding for two policies:

- Raising the attainment of disadvantaged pupils and closing the gap with their peers; and
- Supporting children and young people with parents in the regular armed forces

Pupil Premium is additional funding paid to schools in respect of their disadvantaged pupils as declared on the School Census because they are known to have been eligible for Free School Meals (FSM) in any of the previous six years, as well as those first known to be eligible at January census.

Schools are free to spend the pupil premium as they see fit. However they are responsible for how they use the additional funding to support pupils from low income families and other target groups. From September 2012, the government also require schools to publish online information about how they have used the premium.

Principles for the use of Pupil Premium

- To close the gap between Pupil Premium pupils and other pupils in school.
- To ensure that teaching and learning opportunities meets the needs of all our pupils
- To ensure that appropriate provision is made for pupils who belong to vulnerable groups, this includes ensuring that the needs of socially disadvantaged pupils are adequately assessed and addressed.
- To improve attendance/punctuality of those eligible for Pupil Premium
- To increase enjoyment of and engagement with the school curriculum.
- To increase participation in a range of extra- curricular activities, clubs educational visits etc.
- To raise aspirations

In making provision for socially disadvantaged pupils, we recognise that not all pupils who receive free school meals will be socially disadvantaged and that not all pupils who are

socially disadvantaged are registered or qualify for free school meals. Some pupils who do not attract Pupil Premium will also take part in provision, such as Intervention groups.

During 2016/17 Shottery St Andrew's focussed Pupil Premium spending on teacher led intervention groups for Key Stage 2, higher level one to one reading support, increased TA provision to support guided reading and reintroduced TA support in Y5/6. The school provided top-up funding.

Impact

Pupils develop in confidence and self-esteem. End of Key stage data indicates there is no significant gap between advantaged and disadvantaged pupils – see School Data Position Statement – Key Stage 2 – on the Closing the Gap (Disadvantaged pupils).
