



Pupil Premium Funding Report - Shottery St Andrew's CE Primary School Sept 2017 – July 2018

Number of Pupils on roll: 89 (January Census) (July'18)
 Number eligible for pupil premium: 11 ("Ever 6 FSM" and "Ever 4 Service Child")
 Value of pupil premium per pupil: £1320
 Total funding received: £17160 (year ending July'18)

What is pupil premium?

The pupil premium for 2017 to 2018 will include pupils recorded in the January 2017 school census who are known to have been eligible for free school meals (FSM) since May 2011, as well as those first known to be eligible at January 2017.

Pupil Premium Grant provides funding for two policies:

- Raising the attainment of disadvantaged pupils and closing the gap with their peers; and
- Supporting children and young people with parents in the regular armed forces

Pupil Premium is additional funding paid to schools in respect of their disadvantaged pupils as declared on the School Census because they are known to have been eligible for Free School Meals (FSM) in any of the previous six years, as well as those first known to be eligible at January census.

Schools are free to spend the pupil premium as they see fit. However they are responsible for how they use the additional funding to support pupils from low income families and other target groups. From September 2012, the government also require schools to publish online information about how they have used the premium.

Principles for the use of Pupil Premium

- To close the gap between Pupil Premium pupils and other pupils in school.
- To ensure that teaching and learning opportunities meets the needs of all our pupils

- To ensure that appropriate provision is made for pupils who belong to vulnerable groups, this includes ensuring that the needs of socially disadvantaged pupils are adequately assessed and addressed.
- To improve attendance/punctuality of those eligible for Pupil Premium
- To increase enjoyment of and engagement with the school curriculum.
- To increase participation in a range of extra- curricular activities, clubs educational visits etc.
- To raise aspirations

In making provision for socially disadvantaged pupils, we recognise that not all pupils who receive free school meals will be socially disadvantaged and that not all pupils who are socially disadvantaged are registered or qualify for free school meals. Some pupils who do not attract Pupil Premium will also take part in provision, such as Intervention groups.

Terms on which PPG is allocated to schools

The grant may be spent in the following ways:

- for the purposes of the school, that is for the educational benefit of pupils registered at that school
- for the benefit of pupils registered at other maintained schools or academies
- on community facilities; for example, services whose provision furthers any charitable purpose for the benefit of pupils at the school or their families, or people who live or work in the locality in which the school is situated

The grant does not have to be completely spent by schools in the financial year beginning 1 April 2017, some or all of it may be carried forward to future financial years.

During 2017/18 Shotton St Andrew's used Pupil Premium funding to: support engagement in the Achievement for All Programme; teacher led intervention; nurture programmes and inclusion in extra curricular opportunities.

Impact

Pupils develop in confidence and self-esteem, the school has recently purchased the Boxall Profile to support measurement of impact. Achievement for All data indicates pupils receiving targeted support are making benefitting from the programme.
